## RACE to Be Human Film Program Survey Results

We surveyed 150 educators across 34 countries from the <u>American School Counselors Association (ASCA)</u> and the <u>International School Counselors Association</u> <u>(ISCA)</u> about their experience with our film RACE to Be Human (for ages 10 and up). Here is what we learned:

9 out of 20 educators feel their school isn't adequately addressing the racial issues in their community.

## However,

72% of educators felt more open to talking about race and racism after seeing this film.







## Demographics



25% of responses were BIPOC/AAPI, and 75% of responses were White.

85% of educators identified as female, 12% were male, and 2% were non-binary or preferred not to say.
